Dr. Leber Retires

ith a total of five college degrees, two bachelors, two masters, and a doctorate, and a long list of accomplishments during his 28 years with the Shipyard, Dr. Leber has decided it's time to retire. "The world is not going to slow down for me," Dr. Leber says. He has a list of things he wants to accomplish in his retirement including maintaining the birdfeeders at his home in Tennessee.

Dr. Leber is quick to reference another list that includes the items he and his team accomplished at The Apprentice School during his six and half years as head of the School. Dr. Leber believes his greatest accomplishments include increasing awareness of the School so that it is now recognized at the state and federal level as one of the nation's premier registered apprentice programs. He is also proud of the expanded diversity in the student body. Dr. Leber notes that there were 67 females enrolled in The Apprentice School when he first became director and now there are 156. Plus the School has doubled the number of advanced programs to provide apprentices with more opportunities within the company

"Remember from day one you're working on your legacy", says Dr Leber. Dr. Leber wants his legacy to be that he encouraged and helped apprentices reach their highest potential, hopefully becoming vice-presidents and presidents of the Shipyard someday. Words that he lives by are "Treat all people with respect regardless of their position in life," and "Take advantage of every opportunity you are given." "Do a damn good job with the opportunities in front of you and from

that many more opportunities will open up to you". He would like us to remember that we are in a win-win situation with the company with 42% of its line management coming from The Apprentice School graduates, which means apprentice graduates are taking advantage of the opportunities provided by the Shipyard.

When looking back he says that the funniest thing he remembers is when the School's former athletic director Bill Casto informed him Arizona State was threatening to sue The Apprentice School for "using" its logo. Dr. Leber said his response to Bill was "Great!" Dr. Leber noted that the look on Mr. Casto's face was priceless in that he did not understand how being sued could be great. Dr. Leber advised Mr. Casto that it was one more sign that The Apprentice School had "arrived" when an educational institution such as Arizona State was concerned about our identities being confused".

Dr Leber said his tenure as head of the School actually ended the end of December. Everett Jordan has taken his place to become only the 8th director in the School's 90 year history and the first Apprentice School graduate to assume that position. Dr. Leber will stay involved with the School by getting the new Apprentice School Complex started. Dr. Leber said a significant number of consortiums have expressed interest in the project and will be submitting initial proposals by January 20th. Dr. Leber wants the new Complex to include Apprentice Apartments built around quad dorms that house state-of-the-art facilities with individual study spaces, bedrooms, bathrooms, and the latest in wifi. The apartments



will be set up similar to quad dorms at CNU.

With all the wonderful words of advice and leadership from Dr. Leber, we just want to say thank you. We hope you enjoy the mountains of eastern Tennessee overlooking Lake Cherokee. We can hear the thousands of wild song birds calling your name all the way out here in southeastern Virginia. Your presence will be missed.




One of the big changes that I feel will impact the Apprentices and The Apprentice School, I am
