Northrop Grumman Newport News is partnering with the Peninsula Habitat for Humanity to build the "Labor Management House" for future homeowner, Maleka Copling. On November 23, a "keel laying" ceremony was held and attended by representatives from Northrop Grumman Newport News, Local 8888, Habitat for Humanity, and the Newport News Redevelopment and Housing Authority. "This is probably the first house in America that started with a keel laying," said Danny Hunley, Northrop Grumman Newport News director of Trades, Education and Training. For the Nov. 23 "keel laying", the future street number of the home was inscribed on a metal plate by future inhabitant Maleka Copling and Northrop Grumman Newport News welder Neal Metcalf welded the numbers to the plate. The plate will be permanently attached to the home when it is finished. "I always dreamed of owning my own home," Copling said, "but I never thought I'd be this blessed." Habitat for Humanity has built more than 150,000 houses worldwide which have sheltered more than 750,000 needy people. Despite some good hustle the Builders lost 78 to 58 in the first round of the tournament. In the second round of the tournament the Builders defeated division 2 Fairmont State College 78 to 68. November 30th the Builders got off to a slow start against Averett University and were defeated 81 to 65.

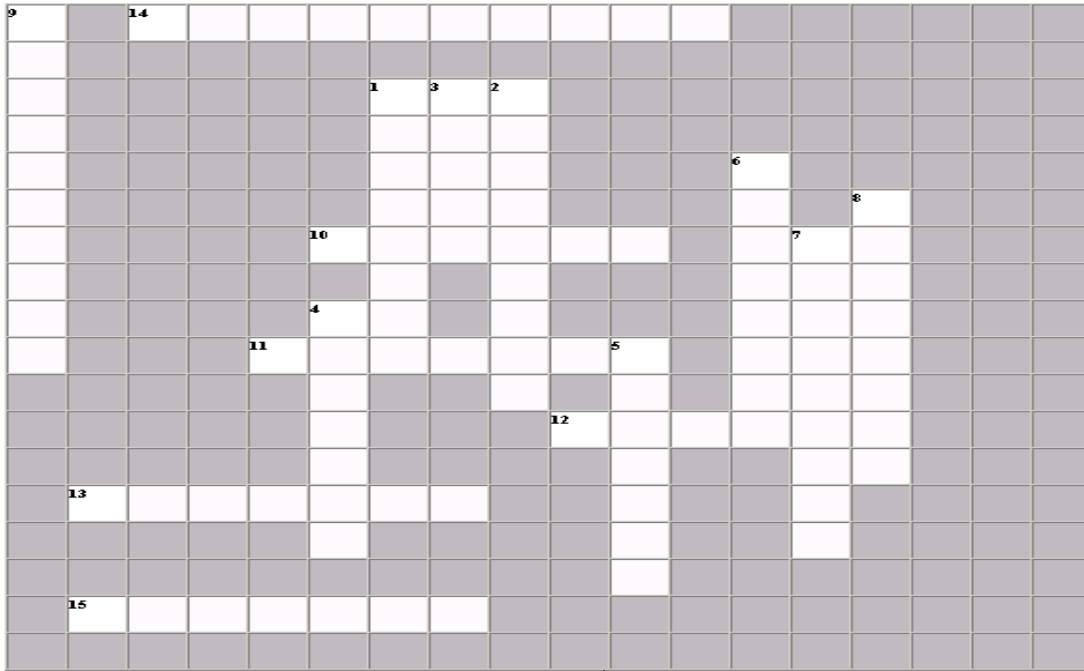

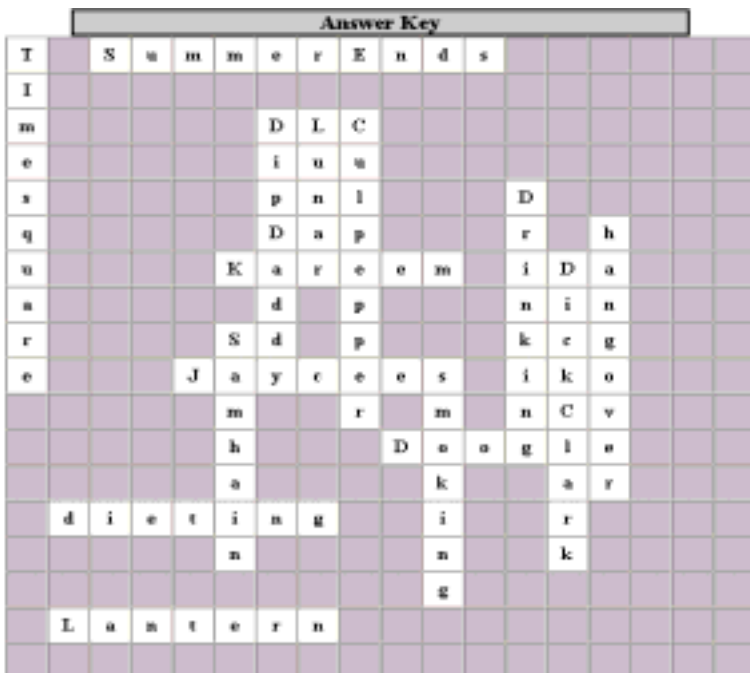
